All online courses include Web-based discussion boards for students and faculty, regular conference calls, systematic lesson plans, and a wide variety of learning projects to help students apply their learning in their local communities.

All courses are available at the *introductory* level for those who do not want to take a university-level course, at the *intermediate* (undergraduate) level for those wishing to go into more depth, and at the *advanced* (graduate) level for those wishing to do extensive research or writing.

This course has had a great impact on my Baha'i life, and the Wilmette site itself is unique. The Institute allows the student to study at their own pace, at their own level, and in their own interests. This is a place for the seeker, the new Baha'i, and the not so new. Light hearted and/or serious discussions among participants fosters desire to push oneself deeper into the writings, tests ideas which previously one would have been shy to voice. This course promoted this interaction-with oneself and with others, either online or in my personal life. I have been able to contribute to my community more during Feasts, post-convention meetings, teaching events, and just in daily life because of the skills acquired during this class. I have more confidence in what I say in reference to the Faith because I have applied the skills learned during this class to be certain of my facts, know the circumstances in which events had occurred, and why our Baha'i history unfolded as it did. I am applying the skills acquired to ensure when I teach I have the knowledge to be accurate and interesting when I give a class or lecture on a Baha'i subject.
